

Originally linked to the continuous quality improvement movement by Toyota, Lean has now been adopted by many industries including health-care, manufacturing, banking, government entities and many other organizations. This session will provide an overview of the basic concepts from the Project SEARCH Lean curriculum and outline the twofold benefit of promoting Lean practices within your own organization.

Building Leadership in Our Communities Room 140

Leadership comes in many forms, and looks different for each person. 
